	<p><b><i>ArcGIS Online For Your Public Safety Agency</i></b></p> <p><i>This session will provide an overview of the ArcGIS Online platform, and how it can help an organization with beginning (basic) mapping functions to assist in the development of basic analysis and map products for a public safety agency.</i></p> <p><i>This is intended primarily for organizations that do not have a GIS group to support their analysis with more sophisticated desktop analysis and data management.
